## Christmas Seal campaign falling short of its target

The Lung Association of Halton Region has almost reached its 1996 fund-raising goal, but still needs \$66,000 more to send this year's campaign total over the top.

"We are extremely concerned about the consequences of falling short of our goal," said Debbie Mings, Halton Region's Christmas Seal chair. "We cannot cut back on our programs and services any further this year. Cases of asthma are increasing, and fears we may not be able to assist all our clients.

"We sent 126,500 Christmas Seal letters across Halton during the week of November 11, and also followed up with previous donors. The Lung Association is asking you nowtoday— to fill out a cheque in whatever amount you can and put it in the mail in the envelope we've provided," she says.

This year, 33,000 Canadians have died from lung disease.


