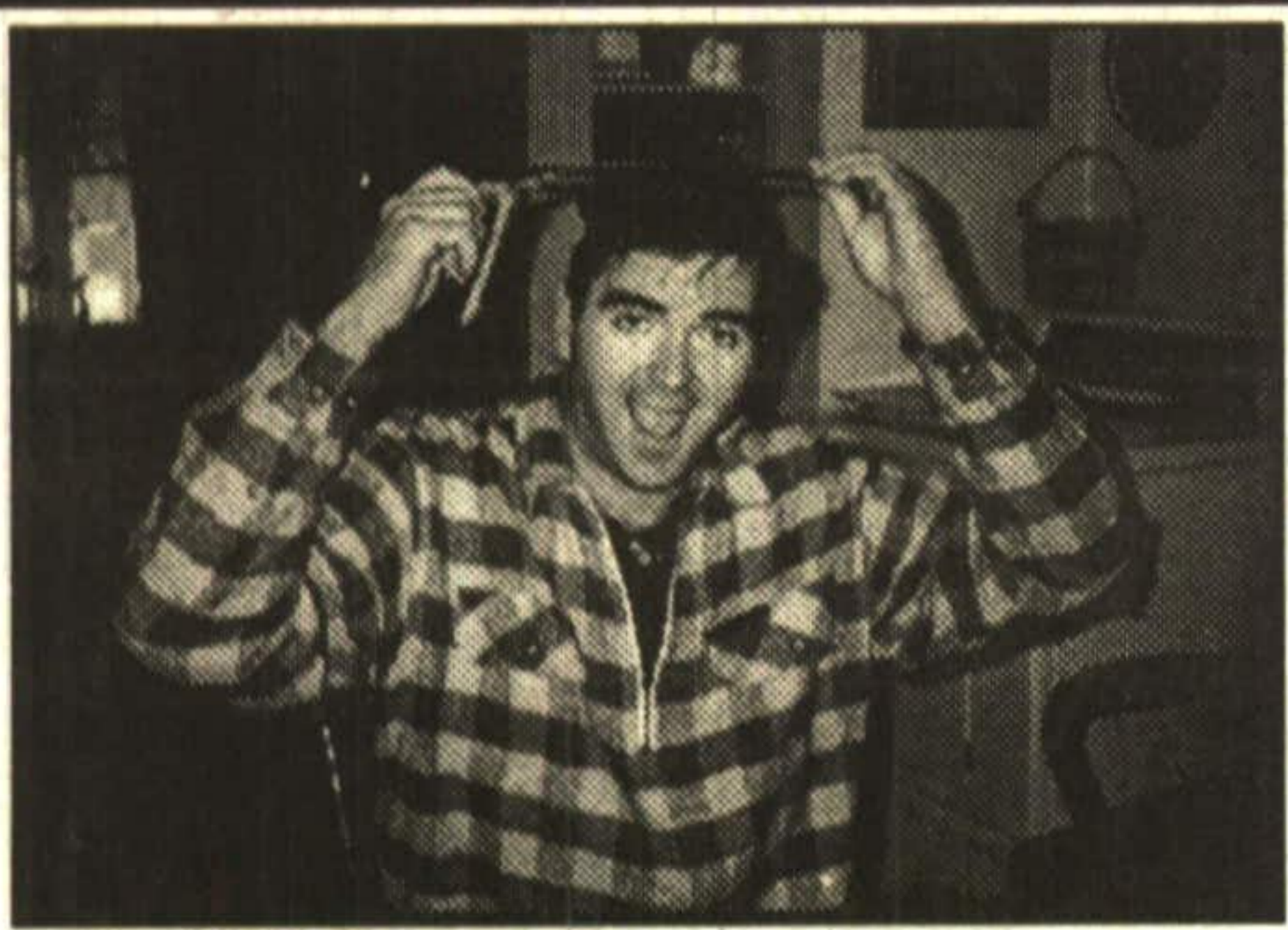


Wanted: old eyeglasses for people in other countries
