'Comeback kid' rallies to claim YBC singles title

Kruk captured the provincial Youth Bowling Council bantam girls singles title in Toronto by rallying from 64 pins down in the final game.

The Grade 5 student at Robert Little School bowled a 231 in her final game, creating a swing of 92 pins. In doing so, she became the first Acton bowler to win an Ontario YBC championship.

The result was the opposite of last year when Kruk placed second. That time she led heading into the final game of the tournament which pits the province's 16 zone winners against one another. This year she finished with a total 1063, for an average of 213. Kruk said having played at provincials before helped her.

"It's not a big deal (the second time)," she said. "I wasn't as nervous."

There was little separating Kruk and her closest opponent after the opening game. But in game two, the 10-year-old ran into bad luck. She hit eight head pins and finished with a 149. Meanwhile, her opponent turned in her best game and opened up a 149-pin advantage.

Kruk worked her way back into contention with her best game, a 254, and then a 223.

Gord Labombard of Acton Bowling Lanes, where Kruk holds a 189 average in league play, said the 10-year-old has the right attitude to be successful.
