Animal clinic staff commended

Dear editor,

You have been printing letters about heroes, and I would like to tell you about a few. Dr. Ross and his staff at the Georgetown Animal Clinic are the most caring, compassionate and professional people I have ever had the pleasure of dealing with.

On March 25, our six-year-old shepherd/collie cross, Tabitha, had a sore jaw and trouble eating. She seemed to be in pain. We took her to Dr. Ross's clinic Tuesday morning to be checked out. Dr. Ross called and asked if he could perform a "fine needle biopsy" to see what was wrong. The results were inconclusive. He then performed a biopsy, again the results were inconclusive.

On Good Friday, he called us at home to report that a blood test they had performed was negative and that they would like us to bring her in to the clinic on Saturday to do a head X-ray. They were looking for a tumor. The X-rays showed nothing. Again, Dr. Ross phoned us at home and asked if he could perform another biopsy, this time taking more tissue. Easter Sunday passed and Tuesday, April 1, we went to see Dr. Ross. The results were conclusive. Tabitha had osteo-melanoma (bone cancer).

Dr. Ross had expert opinions from three pathologists. There really was no course of action, the cancer was spreading too quickly and surgery would not take all the cancer and she would also be in pain. We decided to put her down to end her suffering.

Everyone at the clinic was caring, compassionate and they are the hardest working people I know caring for the dignity of animals. We want to thank Dr. Ross and his staff for their hard work and caring nature.
