Mock disaster called a success

The blood, broken bones and screams of the "accident victims" were artfully fake, but the test was very real for participants in Saturday's mock school bus-GO train accident in Georgetown.

Could emergency services staff successfully triage, treat and transport 50 victims if it had been a genuine accident?

By all accounts, the answer

is yes as organizers of the joint emergency patient care exercise, dubbed "Exercise Victoria", identified only minor areas that need work to be better prepared for the real thing.

"I was more than happy to have people make mistakes, because that's why we had this exercise," explained Greg Sage, Educational Services director of the Halton Hills Ambulance Service following the exercise.

"I think that this exercise showed that the policies are in place to deal with a multipatient accident, but we need to practise and apply those policies more," Sage explained.

Monitored by a team of observers, participants from nine agencies including the Fire Department, Ambulance Service, Georgetown and
