For quite some time now, Ontario's hospitals have been taking it on the chin from the provincial government.

They have been forced to cut back in a variety of areas. They have cut staff, services and even the number of operational beds, but now it seems that the Ontario government and Premier Mike Harris are prepared to put something back into the system.

While we've been subjected to long lines in emergency rooms and heard many of the horror stories, it seems the government of the day is now prepared to move ahead.
