This past Friday 22 members of the Halton Region Conservation Authority (HRCA), including Halton Hills Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson and Acton Councillor Clark Somerville, were to have headed to a Victorian Inn in Ingersoll for a strategy session that, in essence, is being held to determine how the HRCA can be more cost-efficient.

The cost for this little junket is \$200 per person. After all, a night's stay at a resort which boasts elegant dining, whirlpools, a spa and spacious rooms in a gothic house doesn't come cheap.

Unfortunately, only one member of the HRCA— Flamborough's Paul Kidd— voiced any concern (or disgust) that the HRCA would spend this amount of taxpayers' money on a strategy session which is essentially designed to determine how to save money.

HRCA general manager Theresa Maguire-Garber defended the out of town trip, saying it will "maintain people's state of concentration, their state of mind."

What's wrong with setting up shop in a boardroom somewhere in Halton and ordering in food or going to a nearby restaurant?

Serjeantson, who was unsure if she would stay overnight Friday, said the Town of Halton Hills doesn't practise "these methods of doing things" but she "would not criticize it either".

She should have—and loudly. So should have others. It doesn't matter if some, like Somerville, say they won't be spending the night. It is wasteful spending and a slap in the face to taxpayers.
