ing to your concerns. I will take this opportunity to remind residential and business taxpayers that they can pay property taxes through the pre-authorized tax payment plan over a 10-month period.

If you intend to challenge your provincial property assessment, do it immediately. Forms are available at the town's finance department.

The Phase-In Program for tax payments has been automatically applied to properties that qualify under the provincial regulations and regional policy. To qualify for the Phase-In Program, residential properties must have a tax increase due to assessment over 15 per cent and the increase must also be greater than \$300. Tax increases due to provincial

downloading, changes and pooling do not qualify for the phase-in. A typical Halton Hills tax bill has a tax increase as a result of provincial changes of 4.3 per cent and a tax increase due to provincial mandated tax shifts of 1.7 per cent.

I am a member of the Halton Hills Community Support and Information— a multi-service organization supporting people of all ages in the development of a caring and responsive community. It is incredible all the services that this group provides for our citizens, particularly seniors. There are two office locations. One is in Acton at the old town hall, and the other is in Georgetown at the Indoor Mall near the Beaver Lumber store on Guelph Street.


