Team now 3-2-1

Raiders find winning is no cause for panic

Jou can tell things are changing when the Georgetown Raiders are disappointed with a split of their weekend games.

Despite a 3-2-1 start for a team that has averaged only six wins a season over the last six years, Georgetown Raider coach Jay Anderson isn't about proclaim the season a success after two weeks.

"It's still way too early," he said following Sunday's 8-5 win over the Niagara Scenic. "A few injuries and a season can turn around very quickly. If we have 15 wins at Christmas, at least then we'll have answered some of the critics."

However, the team's strong start has afforded the Raiders a rare luxury.

"At this point last year we were 0-6 and everyone was reaching for the panic button," Anderson said. "There isn't any


kind of panic this year."

There was no panic as the Raiders headed into the final period tied 3-3 with the winless Scenics. They came out and scored four times in the first four minutes of the period, including a pair in the first 46 seconds.

Stace Page, Cerrone Natale and Shayne Kanyo, who was returned to the Raiders from the OHL's Kingston Frontenacs in time for Saturday's game, each scored twice. Curtis Carr and Scott MacDonald, who scored his team-leading seventh goal, also scored. Jason Read had three assists, giving him eight points in the last four games.

Saturday at home against Streetsville, the Raiders battled back to tie the game at six only to lose 7-6 on a goal with two minutes to play.

"We had two glaring defensive errors and two stupid penalties," Anderson said. "We gave

For now, Anderson may be willing to live with the mistakes of his young defence, but he won't tolerate the penalties. Rob LaRose didn't dress for Sunday's game after he punched a Streetsville player from the Raider bench, wiping out a Raider power play.

The Raiders got a pair of goals from Scott MacDonald and one each from Curtis Carr, Andrew Sandziuk, Jason Read and Ryan Fairbarn.

A fter a week in which bad luck greeted Katie Rowland at L Levery turn, she turned her fortunes around by helping Canada win the bronze medal at the Commonwealth Games.

Rowland, the reigning Canadian women's gymnastics champion, had to seriously be wondering if she would ever get to Kuala Lampur, Malaysia. Rowland's week began with all her money being stolen from the team's training facility in Montreal. Then, four days before the competition, she sprained her ankle while practising a vault.

To top things off, the Canadian team was scheduled to fly Air Canada to the Games but a pilots' strike forced some last-minute shuffling to other airlines.

Finally settled in Malaysia, Rowland

The Grade 12 student at Georgetown District High School is considering university instead of returning for her OAC year after drawing the attention of the University of Michigan and the University of Utah.

"When training's done, it's a matter of deciding what's the highest priority," she said. "I try to get things the day before if I'm going to miss the class. My teachers are really good about helping me out."
