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

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leachers strike 'as a last resort

alton secondary schools were shut down Thursday as teachers Astaged a one-day strike to protest stalled contract negotiations and the implications of Bill 160 on teaching time.

The Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation (OSSTF) informed the Halton District School Board of the strike Tuesday afternoon and letters were sent home with students Wednesday.

"We're hopeful that with this action today, there will be more opportunity to talk with the board," said Georgetown District High School teacher Dave Laidlaw. "We've done this as a last resort. We could have withdrawn fully, as some boards have, but the students' education is the primary importance."

Teachers walked the picket line for about four hours Thursday then took their protest to local MPPs' offices and went door-to door distributing leaflets.

Debbie Marklew, an Oakville trustee and the chair of the board's negotiating committee, said the strike itself will have no impact on negotiations.

"We knew there were going to rotating strikes throughout the province and today is Halton's day. We expected this day to come."

However, she was distressed by some of the literature being circulated by the OSSTF.

"They've gone public with the issues of negotiation in the middle of negotiations," said Marklew. "It makes me wonder, are they prepared to negotiate or are they digging in their heels?"

Colin Bain, a history teacher at Acton High School, said settlements by the Wellington and Waterloo boards provided some optimism for reaching an agreement but wondered if the board was doing all it could.


