oyal Canadian Air Cadets— 756 Squadron welcomed its new Commanding Officer with a Change of Command Parade, on September 28.



There are treatments that can help. Take the first step with a free, anonymous depression screening test, and talk with a mental health care professional during Mental Illness Awareness Week, October 4-10.


Tomorrow (Oct. 8), the Canadian Mental


