Earlybird tournament launches minor hockey season this weekend

The first sure sign that winter is just around the corner arrives in town this weekend as the puck drops for the first minor hockey tournament of the season.

While most teams have played their first regular season games, the Georgetown Atom/Novice Earlybird Tournament will kick the season into full swing with 74 games over four days. Forty teams in two divisions will hit the ice, including three local entries.

Raider revival hits rough road

road The respectability was bound to have a few bumps along the way and the Georgetown Raiders hit a couple of them this weekend.

The Raiders lost backto-back games for the first time this year, dropping a 9-3 decision to the Oakville Blades on Friday before losing 7-1 to the Milton Merchants on Saturday. While nobody is expecting the Raiders to dethrone the defending league champions, they do have to make the most of their opportunities against teams such as Oakville, which picked up its first win of the season.

The Raiders, now 3-4-1, will have a chance to get back to the .500 mark when they play Streetsville on Tuesday.

Georgetown played well against the leagueleading Merchants in fiveon-five situations but the Milton power-play tallied four goals, three of them in the final period. Raider coach Jay Anderson wasn't too happy with the officiating, which gave the opposition eight power plays.
