Another colleague told me how his brother-in-law (who lives on a farm) usually brings the turkey for Thanksgiving.


"But just yesterday, as we talked on the phone, he said there might be a problem with supplying the bird this year," he explained, "Since he said it was just running past the window as we spoke."

"But think of it," I protested. "It would make great color! And terrific action!"


I seem to recall him walking away, shaking his head while mumbling something about me needing counselling.

And be thankful.

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
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
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
