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'Village' failed young Randolph

There is a wonderful African proverb that says it takes a village to raise a child. But unfortunately in the case of seven-year-old Randolph Dooley that village failed him.

Randolph died late last month following severe, prolonged physical abuse. His step-mom is now in jail facing a second-degree murder charge.

This Toronto tyke, with large sunken eyes, only knew pain in his last months of life. His frail body was covered with scars, his ribs fractured and liver lacerated. This was child abuse at its very worst and sickened even the toughest of police officers.

As we sit in our comfortable homes in Halton Hills shaking our heads in both sadness and disgust as to what befell young Randolph, we must never forget that cases of child abuse happen all the time everywhere.

Whether it is through neglect, sexual, physical or verbal abuse, there are youngsters in Halton suffering the unimaginable. Just ask the folks who work for agencies which deal directly with children in need. They know child abuse isn't just a big city crime.

What is especially tragic about Randolph's case is that no one came to the aid of this youngster. Where were his immediate relatives, neighbors, teachers and friends? Surely someone must have noticed the suffering this poor child endured. Is it possible that all members of Randolph's "village" turned its back on him? How could they?

All children deserve to be raised in a kind and caring society. They need to know that society will not abandon them in time of crisis. Randolph's death should serve as a lesson to all of us.

Turn your neighborhoods into those "villages" and provide our children— all of them— with a loving and nurturing environment. And if you suspect abuse, for God's sake, speak up.

One more Randolph is one too many.
