



Local Women's Institutes learn about Canadian citizenship and day cares

Ashgrove W.I.'s September meeting was at the home of Norma Alexander. North Halton Literacy Guild requested that we become informed about their community programs. Marion Hunter offered to report back.

The 4-H report was given. Our 4-H leader were recognized. Ashgrove W.I. won first prize on our display, School Days Again, at

Georgetown Fair.

The program was based on Citizenship. Betty Brownridge recalled that Canadian citizenship become official on January 1, 1947. Up to that date we were British subjects with Canadian domicile. In the winter of 1947, a group of Halton Junior Farmers took civic classes through the Ontario Adult Education Board and received their certificates from Judge Munroe of Milton who went to our Guelph conference to administer the oath of citizenship to more than 40 new Canadians from 17 countries. A court is being planned for Georgetown High School.

Linda Semerko, an Early Childhood Educator working locally, was the speaker at the September meeting of the Silver-Wood W.I. Linda, who is also a member of our branch, explained the continued influence of Maria Montessori's methods in setting up classrooms, materials and teaching procedures. Any task for young children is reduced to a series of small steps and self-help skills are reinforced. Day care is the bridge between home and school and the foundation for future learning is set during these critical years. Day care can occur in many different settings.

Along with the traditional half-day nursery schools, there are also full-day child care centres, before and after school programs, employer-sponsored child care at or near job sites and lab schools where ECE training occurs. These are all licensed by the Ministry of Community and Social Services and must follow the regulations set out in the Day Care Nursery School Act, which include yearly inspections.

It was with great sadness that we began our meeting, as we acknowledged the recent passing of a longtime member, Doris Lindsay, who worked tirelessly on behalf of the W.I. at many


different levels.
