## Conservation book captures Halton's charm

The charm and uniqueness of Halton's watershed have been captured in a new book put out by the Halton Region Conservation Foundation.

Halton; Rising, Wild and officially Beckoning was launched recently at former MPP Jim Snow's farm in Hornby. The book, which features 160 color photographs of the natural landscapes in the watershed, sells for \$39.95 and all money raised through sales will go toward the cost of expanding and renovating the visitors centre at Mountsberg Conservation Area. The \$95,000 cost of producing the book was covered by many corporate, municipal and individual sponsors. The total cost of the renovation project at Mountsberg is \$1.6 million and it is hoped that \$200,000 will be raised through book sales.

Each chapter in the book is introduced by interesting people, such as Canadian astronaut Roberta Bondar, David Crombie, chair of the Lake Ontario Waterfront Regeneration Trust, and authors of The Niagara Escarpment Portfolio Pat and Rosemarie Keough. Former Halton resident and renowned.

artist Robert Bateman wrote the foreword for the book.


