Acton schools likely to dodge board's axe

recommendation will be forwarded to the committee studying school closures to keep both Acton's public elementary schools open.

told about 65 parents Thursday night that both McKenzie-Smith Bennett and Robert Little Public School will be removed from the Halton District School Board's closure and consolidation review list if the recommendation passes.

With current enrolments, McKenzie-Smith

Superintendent of Education Al Greyson Bennett has 498 students and has 211 excess spaces. Robert Little has 386 students and 98 excess spaces.

"If we were to close one of the schools, we would have the immediate issue of where to put those students," Greyson said.

"Not all of the children in Acton would fit into one of those schools," said Ethel Gardiner, board chair and trustee for Halton Hills. "It would create a tremendous transportation issue so I don't think (a school closure) is a viable option."

Gardiner said the schools' numbers meet the board's criteria for being removed from the list because both have excess capacity that is less than the ministry-rated capacity for the other school.

"I would expect the board to apply that (criteria) consistently across the region," she said.

The board is currently reviewing its schools in an attempt to eliminate an excess 5,828 pupil places. If it does not eliminate those excess places it will not be eligible for government funding to build a new schools.

The recommendation must go to the board's schools accommodation management committee. It would then be passed on to the board. Gardiner said it could be voted on as early as Nov. 4.

Greyson said the Acton schools remained on the list until this point because they needed clarification on how the Ministry of Education would view McKenzie-Smith Bennett. The board physically linked the two schools three years ago and has been operating them as one school since then. But

Kim Wiltshire, 22, of Oak Ridge Dr., died at Georgetown Hospital about two hours after the collision as a result of the injuries she received.


Halton Police are still investigating the accident that occurred at about 8:20
