Minor Atom Raiders

The Raiders dropped their previous game 5-2 to Brampton. Bailey and Jordan McKinnon scored for the Raiders assisted by Bolton and Gingras.

DeGeer and Decker each had four assists in the games, Brad Monte had three and Renaud, Strank, Josh Dewar and Brett Reynolds each had two.

BYLAW NOTICE

NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF ZONING BY-LAWS BY THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF MISSISSAUGA

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Mississauga passed By-Laws 528-98, 529-98 and 530-98 on the 28th day of October, 1998, under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R. S. O. 1990, c. P.13, as amended.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board in respect of the By-laws by filing with the Clerk of the City of Mississauga not later than the 24th day of November, 1998, a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the By-law and the reasons in support of the objection, together with a cheque in the amount of \$125.00 for each of the By-Laws payable to the Minister of Finance.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal a Zoning By-law to the Ontario Municipal Board. A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or group on its behalf.

By-Law 528-98

EXPLANATION OF THE PURPOSE EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

That Zoning By-law 5500 be amended as follows:

- (1) to amend the definitions of "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant" and "Take-out Restaurant";
- (2) to delete the land use and parking standards for "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant (Drive-Through Window)" and "Take-out Restaurant", and substitute with revised standards of 16.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (Restaurant) for "Restaurant" and "Convenience Restaurant", and 6.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (Restaurant) for "Take-out Restaurant", and to add the stacking lane requirement to the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Restaurant;
- (3) to amend footnote (5) in Schedule "A" to section 22C, Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses, to delete the stacking lane requirement and state that the stacking lane shall not obstruct any required parking facility;
- (4) to amend the note associated with the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Centre in Schedule "A" to section 22C, Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses;
- (5) to amend the "DC" Zone to permit a convenience restaurant;
- (6) to amend the "CVC" Zone to permit a take-out restaurant;

EXPLANATION OF THE PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

That Zoning By-law 1227 be amended as follows:

- (1) to amend the definitions of "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant" and "Take-out Restaurant";
- (2) to delete the land use and parking standards for "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant (Drive-Through Window)" and "Take-out Restaurant", and substitute with revised standards of 16.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (Restaurant) for "Restaurant" and "Convenience Restaurant", and 6.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (Restaurant) for "Take-out Restaurant", and to add the stacking lane requirement to the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Restaurant;
- (3) to amend footnote (5) in Schedule "I" to section 6(26), Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses, to delete the stacking lane requirement and state that the stacking lane shall not obstruct any required parking facility;
- (4) to amend the note associated with the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Centre in Schedule "I" to section 6(26), Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses;
- (5) to amend the "C1", "C2", "C3", "C4", "C5" Zones to permit a take-out restaurant

BY-LAW 530-98

EXPLANATION OF THE PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

That Zoning By-law 65-30 be amended as follows:

- (1) to amend the definitions of "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant" and "Take-out Restaurant";
- (2) to delete the land use and parking standards for "Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant", "Convenience Restaurant (Drive-Through Window)" and "Take-out Restaurant", and substitute with revised standards of 16.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (restaurant) for "Restaurant" and "Convenience Restaurant", and 6.0 spaces per 100 m² GFA (Restaurant) for "Take-out Restaurant", and to add the stacking lane requirement to the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Restaurant;
- (3) to amend footnote (5) in Schedule "I" to section 6(26), Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses, to delete the stacking lane requirement and state that the stacking lane shall not obstruct any required parking facility;
- (4) to amend the note associated with the Minimum Requirement for Convenience Centre in Schedule "I" to section 6(26), Parking and Loading Standards for Non-Residential Land Uses;
- (5) to amend the "C 1" Zone to permit a take-out restaurant.

All lands in the City of Mississauga (former Town of Streetsville) affected by By-law 65-30.

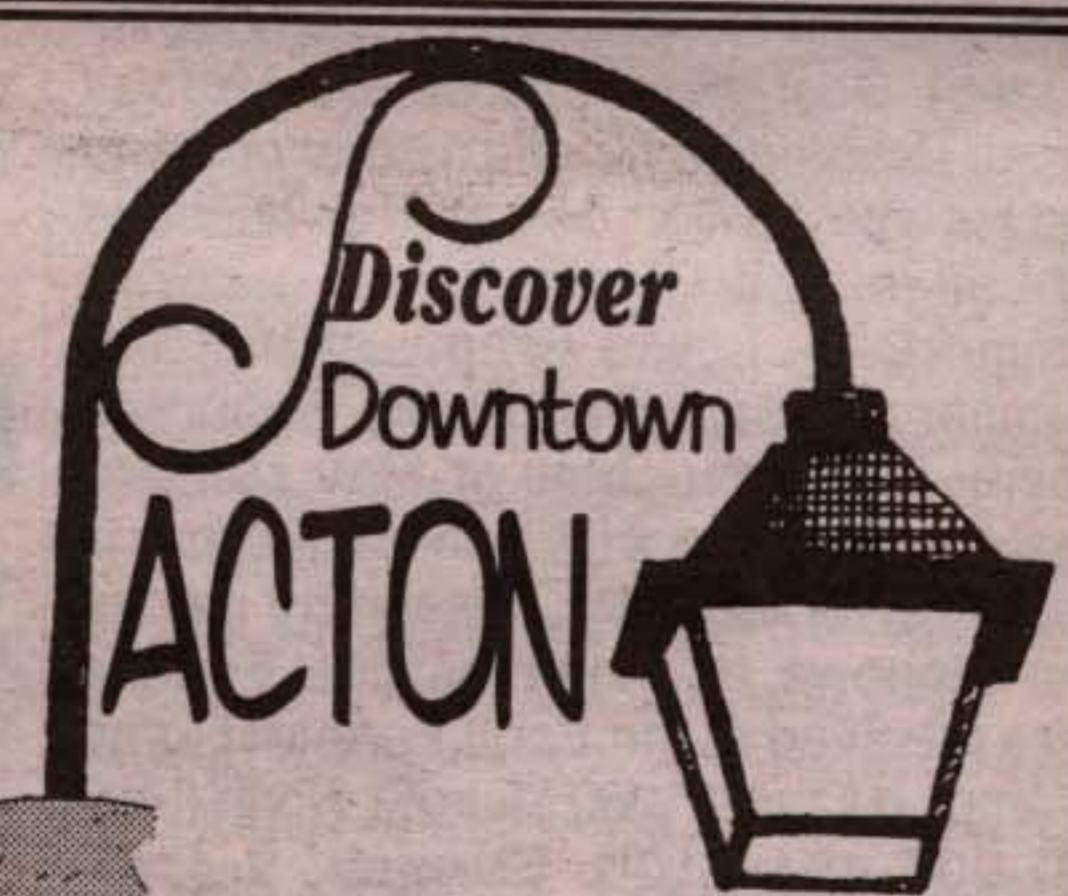
Nominations for Heritage Awards
