Testing...testing...

The latest results from last spring's province-wide testing of Grade 3 students are in and the results for Halton students are promising. Results released last week from the Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) show students from both the Halton District School Board and Halton Catholic District School Board, scored above the provincial average in the tests which measured students' ability in reading, writing and mathematics.


That's great.

What's even better is that there is now a process of province-wide testing, courtesy of the provincial government, that gives students, teachers, parents and school board officials a clear indication of whether or not students are meeting the new higher standards.

Kit Rankin, a superintendent with the Halton District School Board says the testing is helpful because it suggests where a board should focus its attention and the fact the tests are independently assessed means they are graded objectively.

Next year testing will be expanded to include students in Grade 6 as well as Grade 3 and Grade 10 students will be given a written literacy test.

The end result of province-wide testing is quite simple: to ensure today's students are learning what they should learn and to make them well-prepared for the day they leave school.
