

Youth charged



Meeting told

Public wants more info on development

the public should be given more information on how developments will be serviced and should be informed of significant changes to development plans.

Those were the two main suggestions put forward as staff from the Town of Halton Hills and Halton Region reviewed the development process Monday night before a crowd of about 70 people at the Civic Centre. However, Norval residents don't put much stock in those changes ever being instituted.

Pat Murphy, the region's manager of development review, said those changes could have avoided the controversy surrounding the placement of a pumping station in an environmentally sensitive area in Norval.

Murphy said at the time public meetings on developments are held, plans include the number and placement of lots as well as the type of housing to be built, but developers rarely have detailed engineering plans at that time. He said to avoid a situation similar to that of the development in Norval, developers should have to provide more engineering information and if that initial information changes, the public should be notified.

"If there are significant changes that weren't there in the draft plan then there needs to be a process to bring those changes back," Murphy said. "If we present something to the public we owe it to them to go back and inform them if it changes."
