The Rebels' junior boys volleyball team defeated their Halton Hills rivals, the Acton Redmen, 15-10, 15-11 to win the Halton Hills Athletic Association

"Georgetown is a strong team and we played really well against them," said Acton coach Kelly Holmes. "We tried to get up there on the blocks but they were hitting the ball well."

In the second game, the Redmen continued to mix up their offence, tipping the ball over the Rebel blockers to build an 11-9 lead. GDHS was able to

adjust, though, and with improved coverage were able to regain the lead. Consistency also helped down the stretch as Acton made the Rebels fight for each point.

"The serving was really good," said Rebel coach Meredith Sones. "I think we only missed one serve the whole day."

Redmen eyeing OFSAA crown

Halton championship may have eluded them, but the Acton Redmen senior boys' L volleyball team now have their sights set on another title.

Acton will be in St. Mary's for the Ontario Federation of Schools Athletic Association (OFSAA) A championships beginning Friday. But the Redmen may go into the tournament without their best player, Jeff Birrell. Birrell injured his ankle three weeks ago and hasn't played since. Though he's been able to put weight on the ankle, his status is uncertain.

Still, Redmen coach Rob Tannahill says a medal should be within the team's reach.

"I know what this team's potential is and I'd like to see them fulfill it," he said.

If Birrell does miss the tournament, it will be up to veterans Adam Ahearn, Fraser Hewitt and Andre Savard to elevate their games.

It has been a year of full of adjustments for the team. First the season was shortened, giving players less time to learn the new defence, serve reception and rotation that Tannahill, in his first year with Acton, put in place. Also, the team is divided into a group of graduating players and a group of firstyear seniors.

"Both of them are used to playing different styles so it's been a matter of getting them to jive," Tannahill said. "I think they made an excellent adjustment. I brought in a lot of new things but they feel comfortable with it now."

One pitfall Acton will have to avoid is getting off to a slow start. That proved costly in their Halton semifinal loss to T.A. Blakelock. Though there were extenuating circumstances in that game—the team bus had to detour and was late, causing the Redmen to miss their warmup—Tannahill said they can't afford to be playing catch up against teams at OFSAA.

"We got off to poor starts and found ourselves in big holes. We were able to overcome it and win (against M.M. Robinson, in the opening playoff round) but we'll be playing some good teams and they have to focus on the game at hand."
