

Residents offer Halton police their opinion on what level of service the public expects

A bout 15 area residents attended a meeting Wednesday night (Nov. 18) at the Georgetown police station to give their opinions on policing to the Halton Regional Police Service.

Keith Moore, senior planner with Halton Police, said input is being sought from the public to set some goals for the service and determine how many officers will be required. Volunteers are also canvassing the public at the region's shopping malls through the end of the month.

Meetings were also held in Milton, Oakville and Burlington.

At the Georgetown meeting, area residents filled out questionnaires and were asked what

response times they expected from police, as well as what level of service.

Respondents were asked how much of an officer's time should be spent responding to calls for service, on patrol, doing community-based and crime prevention projects.

Moore wouldn't comment on the responses received so far because more are being collected and he didn't want to "taint" those responses.

The same questions have also been posed to members of regional council, the police services board and the project's steering committee.

When all the data has been collected information will be inputted into a computer and a \$45,000 computer program called Staff Wizard will show how many officers will be required based on

the needs inputted. Moore said the Halton service is the only Canadian police service using the program but it has been used for some time in Seattle, Colorado and Liverpool, England.

"It gives a really good picture of how well you are doing right now," said Moore. He added it will determine how many people would be needed optimally.

"This is not the be all and end all of staffing and deployment—it's a tool to assist us with that," he said.

Moore said in the past, staffing needs had been based on historical comparisons, population and crime ratios and the information provided by the computer program is "another piece of the puzzle."

He expects to have the results from running the data through the program early next year.

The Regional Road 25 (Hwy.25) Corridor Strategy will focus on 2 sections, QEW to Burnhamthorpe in Oakville and between Britannia and Derry Roads in the Town of Milton. It is essential that these Corridor Strategies be prepared with the direct participation and involvement of the general public, road users, abutting landowners and residents of nearby neighbourhoods. 
