Doell finished 12th in a field of 80 competitors at the Ontario Cross-Country Championships at the University of Waterloo. The result was

ed because many of her teammates were also in the race. Many of them have also qualified for the national event and together they are hoping to win the team event.

After a ninth-place finish in the midget division at last year's provincials, Doell continued to take great strides forward. That's when her coach at Etobicoke Gladstone suggested she move up two divisions in order to qualify for nationals.

"She's mentally tough, she works hard and she has talent. That's a good combination," said Omar Guzman.

Doell said she hasn't set any individual goals in terms of placings because she's not sure what to expect in terms of the competition.

"I don't know because I've never been there before," she said. "It's going to be the best athletes in Canada, though. I'll just keep my head up and keep going."

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Ex-Ice Dogs' coaches not bitter at feeling the wrath of Grapes

Peter Sturgeon may not agree with Don Cherry's decision, but he can understand it.

The Mississauga Ice Dogs' first coach and general manager was fired on Sunday, as was his assistant Adam Bennett.

"I was asked to be the general manager and coach under certain conditions and I fulfilled that to the best of my ability," Sturgeon said. "Our goal was patience and long-term success and we were prepared to go through those developmental challenges."

Cherry obviously wasn't. With the Ice

Dogs sitting at 1-21-1 and in last place in the Ontario Hockey League, the Ice Dogs' majority owner fired Sturgeon and Bennett following Sunday's 3-0 loss to Ottawa.

"I felt we had done everything that we were asked to," Bennett said. "As far as the time line goes, that's Don's decision, but I feel we did the best we could with what we had."

Sturgeon said he could understand why his former coach in Boston couldn't be as patient as the Ice Dogs' expansion cousins in Brampton, who aren't much better at 3-20-0.

"Because Don Cherry is a global hockey identity, there's a lot of media attention and there had to be tremendous pressure to have instant success."

Cherry said earlier this week that the decision to fire Sturgeon and Bennett became clear when Ottawa coach Brian Kilrea was more upset with his team than Sturgeon was with the Ice Dogs after Sunday's game.

"You can't brow beat them every day. They'd quit," Sturgeon said. "We were playing the best team in the country and it was scoreless through two periods. That's not satisfactory in terms of wins

and losses but the desire and determination was there."

Sturgeon plans to refocus his attention on Pro Bound, his hockey program for developing young hockey players. Bennett said he will concentrate on his financial services career. He said if he returns to coaching, it will be in minor hockey.

"I don't think I'd want to get into it at such a competitive level again," he said. "If I go back it will be to the grassroots where the kids are playing to have fun and playing because they love the game."
