## Region wants current ambulance service... for now

Talton Region has voted to open negotiations with the current suppliers of ambulance service.

The region is to take over ambulance service by Jan. 1, 2000 but the province recently extended the deadline by one year. The province also also announced that it will pick up 50 per cent of the funding for ambulance service.

Until it officially takes the reigns, Halton Region has decided to work with its current suppliers, Halton Hills Ambulance Service and Mississauga Halton Ambulance Service. "We're very comfortable with both," said Dr. Bob Nosal, Halton's medical officer of health. "We have a long history of working closely with them and this gives us the ability to decide what to in the future."

"It's probably the best (scenario) we could hope for right now," said Gord Kearsey, president of Halton Hills Ambulance Service.

Not everyone supported the region's decision, though. The Ontario Council of Hospital Unions/Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) were outside the Georgetown hospital the day after the

region made its decision. CUPE paramedic Carmen D'Angelo said he and fellow paramedics are visiting towns and cities to raise community awareness about the downloading of ambulance service and the threat of privatization. D'Angelo was pushing for an in-house ambulance service that would make paramedics regional employees, something which both York and Durham Regions did. He said that would ensure ambulance service would not be privatized, which could lead to patients being billed for ambulance service.
