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## It's about time

This week (April 18-25) is Organ Donor Awareness Week and the Multiple Organ Retrieval and Exchange (MORE) Program of Ontario, in partnership with the Kidney Foundation of Canada, is urging everyone to make their wishes clear to family members regarding organ donation.

To be sure, organ donation is not a typical family conversation topic, but it is imperative that, along with signing a donor card, your wish to donate any organs are conveyed to family members who will be asked for consent to donate your organs in the event of your death.

In Ontario, we have the longest transplant waiting list in Canada with 1,029 people needing organs as of the start of 1998. In 1997 there were only 162 Ontario donations.

Most people agree that organ donation is a good thing, but in Ontario less than half of the population has signed donor cards. As well, only 2 per cent of deaths occur in such a way as to make organ donation possible.

Heightened public awareness of the procedures involved in organ donation is at the top of MORE's list and during this week they are challenging all Ontarians to sign their donor cards and discuss organ donation with family members.

According to Graham Scott, who chairs MORE's board of directors, "It's far more likely that someone will need an organ transplant than become an organ donor. For all the people waiting for the life-saving call telling them an organ has become available, we need to make organ donation a priority in Ontario. It's about time."

Scott is right in that it is all about time. For someone needing an organ, time can be both a terrible enemy and a great friend. Your donation may allow someone else the chance to enjoy a summer's day, a concert in the park, a walk with a loved one. You could be a life-saver.

We urge all readers to sign their donor cards and

relay their wishes to family members.
