On May 16 at 9:30 a.m. the congregation at St. John's will be having their 163rd Anniversary Service, with guest preacher, The Reverend Dr. Hal Llewellyn, flutist Catherine Richardson, and a historical sketch by Nan Wheeler. Hospitality and brunch to follow.

For those of you following politics, town council has referred the report on a historical designation for Glen Williams to staff for comment. This is the first step towards getting recognition and protection for Glen Williams' unique character.

Council has also initiated the process of preparing a secondary plan for Glen Williams. This will determine the future of our little hamlet and will include a number of public meetings and volunteers from the community to sit on the steering committee. The bulk of the activity will begin after the summer. The applications for new developments around the Glen are awaiting the outcome of this process before they can go ahead.

There have been representatives from the Glen speaking at council about these matters from the new Glen Williams Community Association (GWCA). At last count the membership was 150 and the forms are still coming in. The biggest issue right now is the North Halton Transportation Study, which would designate Wildwood Road, Main Street to Prince, and Prince Street as minor arterial roads. The GWCA will be reporting back to the community on these issues and others at a general meeting in May. In the meantime, for membership information contact Vicky Duncan.
