


Pickup swiped

They're off! Candidates ready to hit the hustings as Ontario goes to the polls June 3

ith the provincial election date set for Thursday, June 3 Halton riding candidates are on the campaign trail.

Vying for the provincial seat in the riding which spans Halton Hills, Milton and parts of north Burlington and north Oakville, are Progressive Conservative (PC) Ted Chudleigh (the incumbent in Halton North), Liberal Mohan Anand, New Democratic Party (NDP) candidate Jay Jackson and Family Coalition Party


(FCP) candidate Giuseppe Gori. At press time confirmation on a Green Party candidate for the riding was not available.

Chudleigh, 55, called the election the most important "for Ontarians in the post-World War II era" and said it comes down to a "choice between two very different camps."

He said Ontario voters can support the PCs who, in the past four years, have reduced taxes 99 times, brought 540,000 new jobs to Ontario, and given hope and dignity to 370,000 people who are now off welfare rolls.

"The alternative is a return to tax and spend government of the previous ten years," said Chudleigh who will run on the Blueprint for Ontario platform which includes tax cuts, increased spending on health care, guaranteed funding and standards in education and an infrastructure plan.
