#### Commemorating history

Father Donat Gionet and Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson unveil a new historical plaque on the front wall of Sacre Coeur Church on Guelph St. The plaque commemorates the Roman Catholic community in Halton Hills. The first mass was celebrated in 1852 by Jesuit missionaries and by 1858 the first church, St. Patrick, was built at 50 Main St. S. In 1885, the Sacre Coeur building was constructed and named Holy Cross. In 1956 the community was raised to parish status and in 1965 Holy Cross Parish moved to their new church at 224 Maple Ave. In 1966, this church began serving the Sacre Coeur french-language parish community.
