

Memories of a great golfer

Dear editor,

Re: The recent death of golf legend Gene Sarazen.

In 1924 I caddied for Gene Sarazen in the Canadian Open.

It was held at the Mount Bruno Golf Club in Quebec. The caddy master advised me that Mr. Sarazen was arriving in a few minutes and told me to go and get his clubs. There were a lot of temporary caddies there also and they were trying to get the bag away from me. Gene was reluctant to let me have the bag and the bigger boys agreed with him by kicking me in the shins and ankles.

I was fortunate that Mrs. Sarazen was there because she kept pleading with her husband to let me have the bag.

I caddied for Gene for five days— two practice days and three days for the tournament. He came second in the tourney and paid me \$15 for the five days.

When he gave me the money he asked if that was okay. I tell you, at that time when I was only 13 years old, that was a fortune, along with the \$9 a week I earned from the golf club.

I regret that my mother threw away a photo that I had of me posing with Gene and his lovely wife in front of their car. It was many years later in 1945 I was offered the job of secretary-treasurer of the Mount Bruno Golf and Country Club.
