When I left home that morning, I didn't expect to be wading through a mosquito-infested swamp, my nearly new Rockports squishing through the mud (never to be new again).


But the raid was well worth it. The week's haul of marijuana plants confiscated in Halton was estimated around the \$1.5 million mark.
