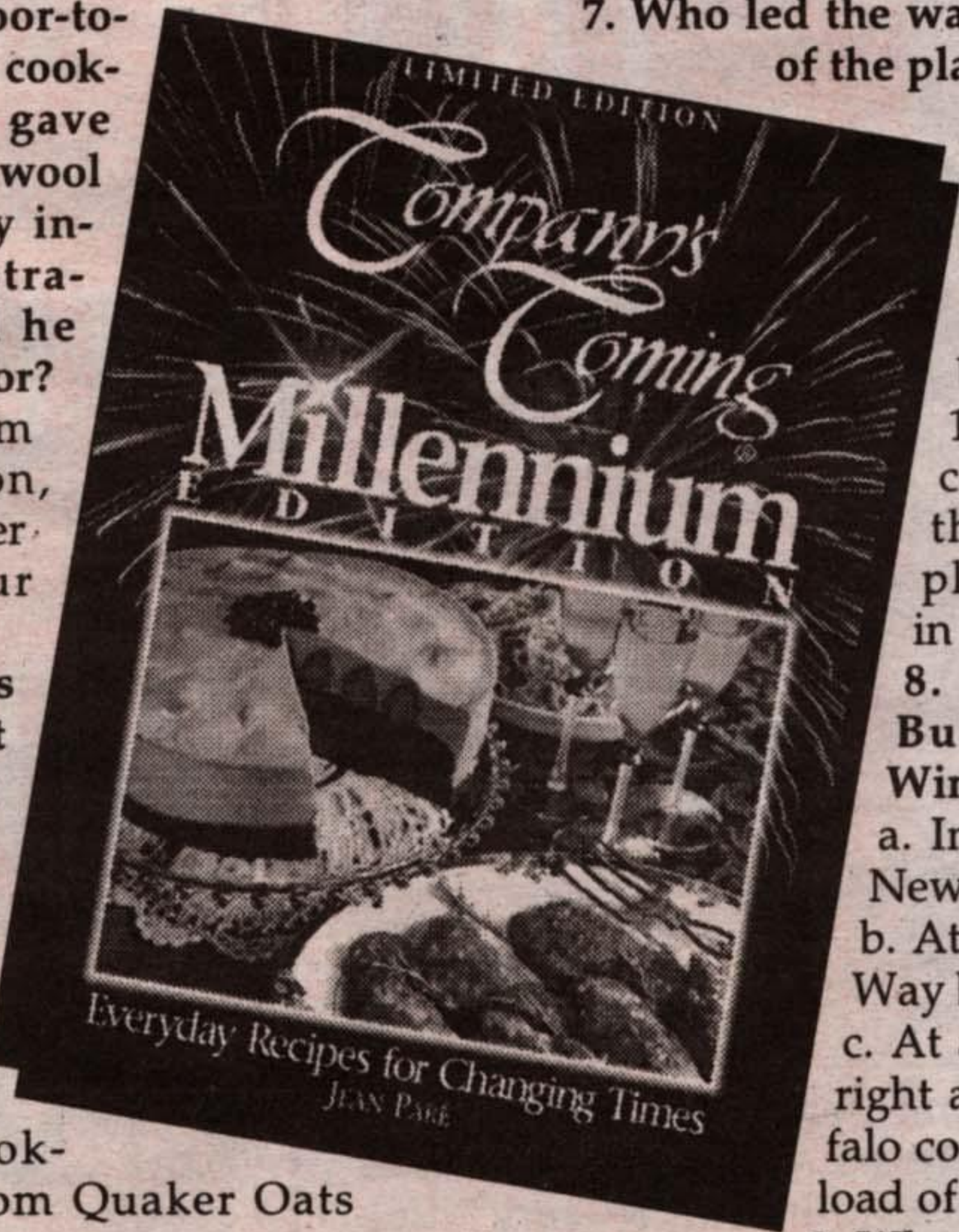

A grand total of 162 draws will be announced throughout 2000, with \$8,000 to be awarded in prize money.

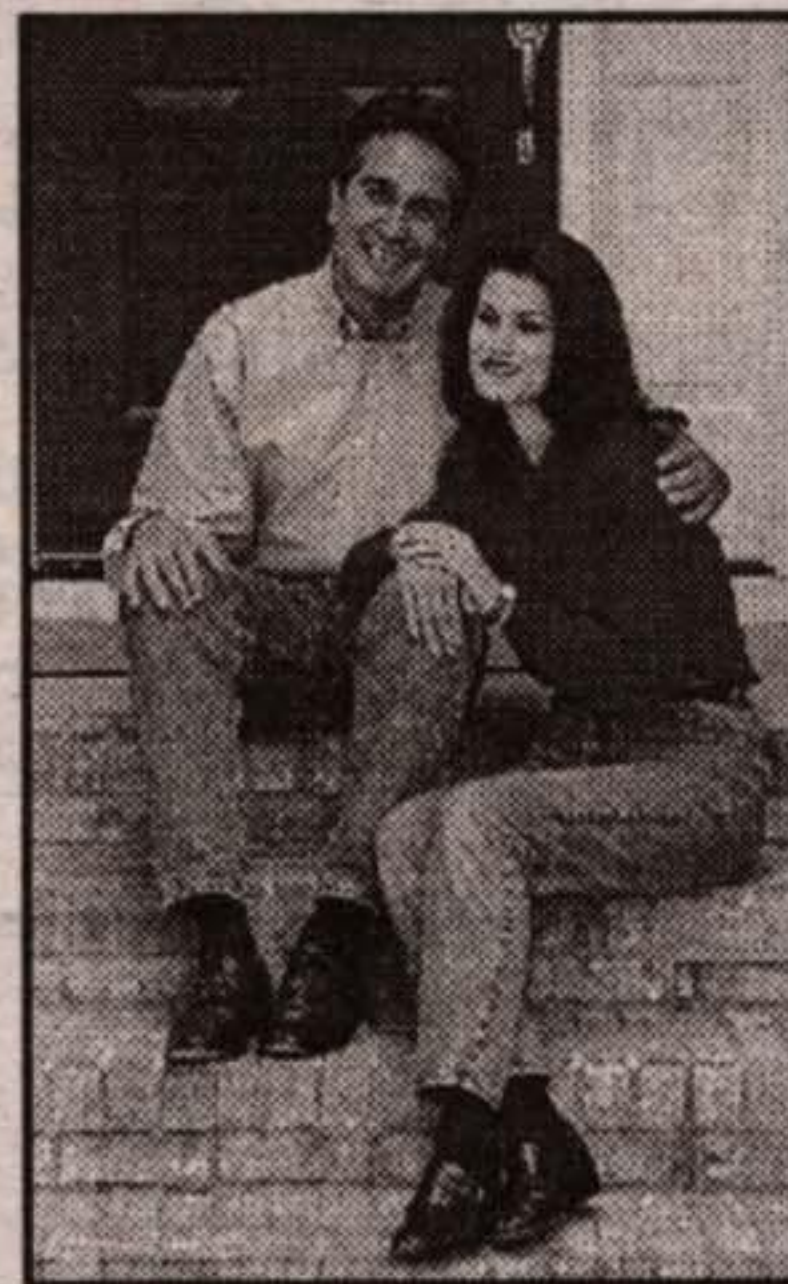
