Raiders easily dump Merchants

Raiders beat the Milton Merchants is not surprising. But few could have predicted the ease the Raiders would dispatch the perennial powerhouse on Saturday.

Georgetown built a 5-0 lead on their way to a 6-2 victory that didn't even reflect how convincingly they toppled their north Halton neighbors.

"Any time you play a tough team you have to rise to the occasion," said Jeff Seeds, who continued to be a thorn in the side of his former team with two goals and two assists.

With the memory of last week's 7-3 loss in Milton still fresh in their minds, the Raiders went about proving they are serious challengers to Milton's throne.

"If we didn't win tonight, finishing first would have been tough," said goalie Jeff Hladysh. "I think tonight showed how important that extra home game could be all the way through the playoffs."

The win moved the Raiders within two points of the conference-leading Merchants, and just as important kept them ahead of the pack of four teams

Challenging for second place.
Only seven points separate the top six teams.

The Raiders jumped in front early when Adam Bertoli and Tristan Fairbarn capitalized on a checking from behind major to Milton's Ryan Eby. Meanwhile, the Merchants' shotgun offence was reduced to a pop gun. Georgetown allowed only 17 shots in the first two periods with at least four of those coming in the final two minutes of the second, when Milton finally beat Hladysh.

"They were keeping the shots to the outside and it's really easy to stop them when you can see them coming from the blueline," the third-year netminder said.

Though it didn't dominate the third, Georgetown did limit Milton to one power-play goal.

"In the past we've had some lapses in the third," said defenceman Billy Fetherston, who had two assists. "In the dressing room (before the third period) we just tried to stay pumped up. We wanted to keep up the strong defensive zone coverage."

The win was not so much as a surprise to Raider coach Jay Anderson, but more of his team

realizing its potential.

"This is the team we thought we had picked at the beginning of the season," he said.

Friday in Bramalea, Scott MacDonald's third goal of the game gave the Raiders a 4-3 overtime win. MacDonald, whose hat-trick gave him eight goals in

five games, also scored the tying goal with 1:50 remaining.
