

MPP demands school board action— or else

Ted Chudleigh blasted the Halton District School Board and gave it a failing grade in management.

The Halton MPP called the board's trustees irresponsible on Monday, and said the board should be dissolved and run by the province on an interim basis until its accommodation problem is sorted out.

Chudleigh said the board

has done little in response to last month's Education Improvement Commission's (EIC) report on the board's operation.

"The vast majority of school boards have sufficient funds," Chudleigh said. "The funding formula is working extremely well. Some boards manage well, others might get a C grade others a D. I'm afraid we're saddled with a board that gets an F."

Board chair and Halton Hills Trustee Ethel Gardiner said she agrees with the main point

we have decided not to close schools," Gardiner said, "but as an individual trustee, I have voted to close schools and I do recognize the need to have new

The board's vote was split (5-5) on whether to close two schools and amalgamate two others last spring. It recently voted against closing Burlington's Fairfield School, which has only 69 students in a school able to accommodate 287.

Chudleigh said he would like to alter the funding formula so that schools such as Fairfield must be closed.

"If there's a need for a new school, I'd say take the option away from the board," the MPP said:
