Who's Joe?
 Joseph Jefferson Jackson was born in Brandon Mills, South Carolina, July 16, 1887. Joe started his baseball career as a pitcher in the local league. He threw the ball so hard that he broke the catcher's arm, so they put him in the outfield where he played left field. He earned his nickname playing a minor league game in his socks because a new pair of baseball shoes hurt his feet. His lifetime batting average was .356 and, except for Ty Cobb, he was the best hitter in the American League. Joe Jackson still holds the third highest lifetime batting average in the history of baseball and has the most hits ever in a World Series. Joe's swing was so pure and natural that the great Babe Ruth copied his swing and stance. Since his death December 6, 1951, Joe Jackson has been immortalized in fiction and film. Joe stated "God knows I gave my best in baseball at all times and no man on earth can truthfully judge me otherwise". In the movie, 'The Field of Dreams', the voice said "build it and they will come".
