Price too high

the Ontario government launched a new task force to investigate rising gas prices just as prices soared to 66 cents per litre.

"Consumers are fed up," says Halton MPP Ted Chudleigh. He said "consumers are angry and frustrated with what is happening at the pumps. They want action."

An understatement.

It's the mandate of the newly-formed task force, of which Chudleigh is a member, to talk to consumers, consumer advocates and petroleum industry personnel.

What is there really to say? The prices are too high for the average consumer and the prices seem to jump every pay day (Thursday) and before every long weekend.

Simple facts.

Why do we needed to spend thousands of taxpayers' dollars finding out what we already know?

Even more curious is Chudleigh's claim that the federal government isn't doing enough. "I don't think the federal government is taking the issue seriously enough."

However it's Reed's claim that gas price regulation is a provincial responsibility, not the federal government's. It's a federal responsibility, Reed said, to investigate price fixing among gas operators and for possible collusion between the large oil companies— and they have been unable to prove that.


"We are involved very deeply in partnership efforts for a new fuel that will be coming onto the market shortly," Reed added.

No wonder the oil companies consider gasoline prices fair game when even Canada's politicians can't decide who controls gas price regulation.

It sounds like a classic case of passing the buck—onto the taxpayer.

Chudleigh's task force will meet and talk, talk and meet, and report back some time next spring. Reed's government may have a new fuel to market — sometime in the future.

Meanwhile we continue to the pay the price at the pumps.
