## Crime rate in Halton Hills soars by 8.4%

Thile the crime rate rose slightly in Halton in the first seven months this year, Halton Hills crime rate made a more dramatic jump— climbing 8.4 per cent over the same period last year.

For the first time in 10 years, the region-wide crime rate rose by 1.5 per cent—but despite the slight increase, it remains the safest community in Canada per 100,000 population. Last year, to the end of July in Halton, there were 8,766 criminal offences compared to 9,200 this year.

While Halton Hills' crime rate was up by the end of July it is still seven per cent below the region's rate of 2,454 occurrences per 100,000 population, and the second-lowest rate in Halton. Only Oakville's is lower at 10 per cent below the region's rate. Burlington's rate is four per cent lower than the region's, and Milton's is 76 per cent higher.

Compared to last year, this year (to the end of July) the number of occurrences in Halton Hills increased by 14.2 per cent or 135, to a total of 1,088 occurrences. During the same period last year there had been 953 criminal occurrences.

On the rise in Halton Hills this year so far are break and enters (23.5 per cent), property damage (40.6 per cent) and other criminal code offences such as harassment, threatening, causing a disturbance and passing counterfeit money (40.5 per cent).

Also up this year are domestic assaults (28.6 per cent), assaults (3.7 per cent), sex offences (22.2 per cent) robbery (50 per cent— from two to three occurrences), possession of stolen property (7.7 per cent) and offensive weapons (25 per cent).


