Net result for Raiders has them looking for two puckstoppers

The Georgetown Raiders will score plenty of goals this season. How far the team goes could depend upon how many they surrender.

With the arrival of the news that Jeff Hladysh will be playing university hockey, the Raiders are now venturing into the unknown. As they discovered last season in their search for a dependable backup goalie, the crease is often the toughest spot to fill. Good first impressions, high recommendations and strong play at lower levels do not always translate into success at the junior level. But the Raiders hope to have two solid junior goalies from the four in camp.

Andrew Reynolds is the only goalie signed leaving the Raiders with the remainder of the exhibition season to evaluate three candidates— Matt Fielding, Ryan LaRose and Kyle Rogers—for the other job.

LaRose was an recalled from the Halton Hurricane midgets on an emergency basis last season and shutout the Milton Merchants for half a period. Fielding put up impressive numbers for the Halton Hurricane bantams and was drafted by the Kitchener Rangers in the 14th round of the Ontario Hockey

League draft. Rogers, who is from Thunder Bay, was chosen by Brampton in the seventh round in the 1999 OHL draft.

Despite last year's challenge of finding a backup the Raiders have confidence in the group they have to choose from, although they expect an adjustment period.

"It's a big spot to fill but the fact we have a lot of experience up front should give (the goalies) some confidence," said Raider coach Simon Couture. "We'll be able to score some goals and that will give us more time to work with these guys."

The Raider offence did just that in Monday's 8-4 exhibition win over the Streetsville Derbys, a game split between LaRose and Rogers.

Tristan Fairbarn scored twice while Stace Page had a goal and three assists. David Lajeunesse, Bill Fetherston, Daryl Knowles, Mason Drew and Matt Knoepfli also scored. Mike Knoepfli had three assists.

Graham McCulloch of Georgetown scored Streetsville's first goal.

The Raiders and the Derbys meet again tonight in Streetsville. The Raiders then play in Milton Friday and host the Merchants Saturday at 7:30 p.m. at the Alcott Arena.

Veltman's bid for Minto Cup title falls short

The Burnaby Lakers held off Orangeville for an overtime victory in game five of the national Jr. A lacrosse championship and then took the next game to win their second Minto Cup in three years.

And although Georgetown's Peter PETER Veltman came home without the national title, he has no regrets about an outstanding season.

"It was a good experience for me and for the older guys," he said. "It's going to help me for years to come."

Veltman quickly established himself as a threat with three goals and an assist in the opening game of the series and then added two more in the second game. It also earned him the attention of the Burnaby checkers.



"It was tough. It's a six game series and they're a big team," Veltman said. "They were pretty well stuck on me after that first game."

Veltman still managed to share the team lead with seven goals and was second in points with 12. That included a pair of assists in the pivotal fifth game, which Burnaby won 10-9 in overtime.

"If we'd won that game I think we would have won (the series). We still felt we had a shot but they came out hard (in game six) and got a big lead on us."

Trailing by two goals with six minutes remaining, the Northmen fought back to tie the game 8-8 and force overtime. It was the third two-goal deficit they had erased. Orangeville then struck first in overtime but Burnaby scored goals 25 seconds apart with less than three minutes remaining and held on for the win.
