At Midget Field Lacrosse Championships Veltman helps Ontario to title

It took just five seconds for Ontario to show how dominant it would be at the first Canadian Midget Field Lacrosse Championships.

That's how long it took to net its first goal. Over the next eight games, 113 more goals would follow while the opposition would manage only a measly six goals.

"We knew we were going to be strong but we didn't know we'd be that strong," said Daryl Veltman of Georgetown after helping Ontario win the national title in Winnipeg.

Ontario was so overpowering that its closest game was a 12-1 win over Calgary. In the semi-finals Ontario recorded its third straight shutout by blanking Edmonton 17-0. It met Calgary again in the final and cruised to an 18-2 win.

Despite the lack of drama, Veltman said it was still a thrilling victory.

"We're the first team to win it so it was pretty exciting," the 14-year-old said. "(Our league commissioner) got the game ball and we all signed it and it's going to the Lacrosse Hall of Fame."

The Ontario squad was essentially the Orangeville field lacrosse team with four players, including Veltman, added for the national

championship. The Orangeville squad was a tight-knit group that had not lost a game in two years but Veltman, who played with the Brampton Excelsiors this season, said they made the new players feel welcome. He returned their hospitality by scoring 10 goals and setting up 12 more to finish second in scoring in the tournament.

Father, son beat the odds

Like father like son. Four years after his father, Jeff Cunningham, scored a rare albatross on the first hole at North Halton Golf Club, Brampton's Adam Cunningham did the same thing.

He got a two on the 484-yard par-five first hole. Adam, 16, was playing in the club's recent junior tournament.

An albatross is the rarest of golf shots, even less common than a hole-in-one.

In fact, Jeff Cunningham said observers at the course cannot recall any other albatrosses at that hole in the 30 years that the current layout has been used. The fact that a father and son have both achieved it on the same hole makes the odds ever greater.

The elder Cunningham used a two-iron when he made his albatross. Adam, who his father said hits the ball a long way, used a six-iron.

Adam had a blind shot to the pin and thought he had gone

over the green. It was not until he got to the green that he found out his ball had gone into the hole.

Both father and son are avid players. Jeff has been a member at North Halton for 16 years and has an eight-handicap. Adam, who has had a membership since he was 10, has a nine-handicap.
