

## But local health officials not informed

# Halton Hills given special status

The Ontario Ministry of Health has given Halton Hills "underserviced L status" with regard to the number of physicians practising here.

This will make it easier for the town to recruit new physicians, said Halton MPP Ted Chudleigh, who made the announcement to this newspaper Monday. However, representatives at the town, hospital and health council were not yet informed of the decision.

"This is the first step in addressing the chronic need in our community for better access to doctors," said Chudleigh. "This is good news, however the job is not done. We have to roll up our sleeves and use the tools provided by the province to bring new physicians to town."

The Ministry announcement identifies the need for nine general or family doctors in Halton Hills. At the time of its application in February, the town had only 18 full-time and 3.5 part-time doctors—and only three of those were accepting new patients. That's a ratio of one doctor for every 2,330 patients—double the provincially accepted standard. Also at that time, two of Acton's three doctors had reached retirement age.

Acton Councillor Clark Somerville was pleased when told about the announcement, because so many people in town have to go outside the community to receive a doctor's care. Anything that can bring more doctors to town is excellent, he said.

Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson agreed. "Halton Hills is a very desirable community and I hope the reputation we have will draw the medical personnel that we need."

In an interview Tuesday, the mayor said the town has yet to receive any notification about the designation, "and it's hard to jump for joy

when you don't know what you're jumping for." She would like a meeting with ministry staff to explain the future steps the town now needs to take.

"It shows that what we have done up to now has worked," said Serjeantson, "and changes are sometimes slower than anyone wants to see happen, but at least they're happening."

"The designation will help our recruitment effort by covering the costs of travel and accommodation of physicians who visit the community," said Chudleigh. "In addition, Halton Hills will be listed in a document that is widely circulated to doctors looking for a place to practise."

Representatives of Halton Hills will be invited on the annual recruitment tour visiting Ontario's five medical schools. If recruiters are unsuccessful after one year, the Ministry will provide a grant of \$15,000, payable to a new physician over four years, as further entice-

"We see the announcement as a significant step in trying to recruit, and maintain, a sufficient number of family doctors for the (Halton Hills) area," said Tom Dickson, chief of medical staff, William Osler Health Care Centre, which supported the town application. "We know our job of recruitment will be made so much easier."

Halton-Peel District Health Council also supported the town's bid for doctors. Executive director Steve Isaak said Halton Hills is the first area within Halton-Peel to receive this designation, and probably won't be the last. The council is launching its own project to look at the numbers of doctors and specialists in Halton and Peel regions.
