A Caledon man is facing several charges after fleeing an accident Tuesday evening in which a Georgetown man and his daughter were hurt.

The Georgetown man, 52, and his daughter, 7, were traveling westbound on Ontario St. in a 1991 Chrysler when it was struck by a 1993 Chevrolet heading eastbound in the middle of the road. The father and daughter were taken to Georgetown Hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

MP promises barrier arms 'by Christmas'

Py Christmas, barrier arms should be installed at the Fourth Line rail _____crossing where three Acton teens were killed last week.

Halton MP Julian Reed said he has verbal confirmation from Transport Minister David Collenette that the installation of the arms will be fast-tracked.

He said it would normally take a yearand-a-half to get approval and have the arms installed.

"The indication is they'd be installed by Christmas," said Reed.

"If he can make it happen by Christmas I'd be so delighted. That would be wonderful," said Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson, who contacted Reed after the accident and asked for his help.

"I hate this after the fact stuff. It has shaken me very much," said Reed. "The minister stepped in when he needed to."

He said it will cost about \$180,000 to install the arms at the crossing. The federal government will pick up 80 per cent of that bill, with the rest being funded by the railway and town.

Serjeantson said after last November's fatal train-truck crash at the crossing all crossings in town were assessed and it was determined one on Hwy. 25 in Acton required arms. The town submitted a request for funding for that crossing in February or March. She said she understood the warrants to install barrier arms hadn't been met at the Fourth Line crossing.

"I want to make sure we get (barrriers at) both," she stressed.

Serjeantson said the town will meet with Transport Canada and the railway line next week to take the steps necessary to put in the request for the arms at the Fourth Line crossing.
