Region insists water is safe

Bacteria still. showing up in Acton wells

coli bacteria continues to appear in the raw water at • the Davidson and Fourth Line town wells that serve Acton's urban area and Halton Region has launched a study to trace the source.

However, the water entering Acton homes is safe to drink, said Tony Smith, Halton Region's supervisor of water plants. He said the E. coli was detected in the raw water entering the wells, but was no longer present after the water had been treated.

The good thing about E. coli is that it's easy to kill, he said. The bacteria was tested, and it was not the 0157 strain that entered Walkerton's municipal wells and resulted in six deaths last spring.

Smith said the presence of E. coli in well water is not unusual, especially with the increased amount of precipitation this year. He said the overburden (layers of ground) on top of the town's aquifer in the Acton area is shallow, and a lot of water permeates through it quickly.

Halton Region has developed an action plan and has hired International Water Services, at a cost of \$20,000, to trace the source of the E. coli and to develop a plan to eliminate the contamination.


In the meantime, the frequency of microbiological testing at these locations has been increased from weekly to daily, stated a Halton Region staff report presented to planning and public works committee last week.

Overall, Halton Region is spending close to \$200,000 in 2000 to comply
