Blow early 3-0 lead to Milton

Raiders suffer tough loss

Tames within the last ___month of the season are always considered more Emportant. But if the Georgetown Raiders wind up battling with the Milton Merchants for first place, Saturday's loss may well be the most important of them all.

The Raiders pounced on the Merchants for three goals in the first 12 minutes but the Merchants fought back and ended up winning on Andy Rozak's goal with 33 seconds to play. Rozak added an empty netter for a 5-3 final.

It's a game that will haunt the Raiders as long as they're within four points of Milton, as they are now. The win vaulted Milton to the top of the Provincial Jr. A Hockey League's West Conference with 14 points while Georgetown sits one point back, tied with both Buffalo and Mississauga.

The Raiders earned their spot in that group by bouncing back Sunday to down Mississauga 5-2 and improving their record to 6-3-1. It's a pace that puts them slightly behind the 71 they needed to win the conference last year.

Mike Knoepfli got the Raiders going with a goal 37 seconds into Saturday's game. Midway through the period, Adam Russell and Stace Page scored two minutes apart and it looked like a rout. However, Flavio Fagionni scored twice before the end of the period to give Milton some life. Milton tied the game midway through the third, setting up Rozak's last-minute winner.

Sunday the same trio— Page, Knoepfli and Russell —notched goals for the Raiders while Brandon Valente and T.J. Trevelyan also scored.
