Insure your winter is spent relaxing in worry-free comfort by taking the time to conduct any maintenance on your new home in the fall.

Proper maintenance will not only protect one of life's most substantial investments, but the warranty coverage you receive from the Ontario New Home Warranty Program (ONHWP) as well.

Start from the bottom up. Air out the basement and crawl spaces. This prevents mold and mildew from accumulating. Have the furnace and humidifier professionally serviced, and take special care to clean and eliminate all dust and dirt around the furnace, registers and condensing unit.

The chimney and venting system should also be checked to ensure they are both in safe operating condition. Where applicable, inspect and oil exhaust ventilation fans and heat recovery ventilators.

In the kitchen, your range hood filter should be scrubbed with soapy water to prevent grease buildup thus eliminating any potential fire hazards.

Windows and doors should be examined for drafts

entrance doors and improve heat conservation.

If the garden hose connection has a valve inside the house, it has to be shut off and drained from the inside to prevent freezing and bursting.

Other areas outside the home in need of your attention prior to winter include exterior wood finishes,

Other areas outside the home in need of your attention prior to winter include exterior wood finishes, paint and siding. Look for signs of moisture penetrating wood or blistering and peeling paint as this can lead to water seepage. Replace worn window caulking to prevent moisture and cold air from entering the house.

Clear eavestroughs, gutters and downspouts of any debris and ensure that drainage from the roof is unobstructed to prevent leakage into the interior. While on

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the roof, check any vents, louvers and chimney caps for any birds' nests or animals that may be obstructing their openings.

Keep window wells free of leaves to allow water to drain properly toward the footing drainage system. Lot drainage systems are designed to direct water away from the house. Walk around your property and examine the driveway and walkways for cracks that, with water penetration and freezing, could lead to larger, more expensive problems.

Finally, fertilize your lawn or plant a new one. Autumn is the ideal time to do so. And don't forget to protect your shrubs and bushes against the cold with burlap.
