## POWER, community and schools join forces to plant thousands of trees in Halton Hills

OWER's (Protect Our Water and Environmental Resources) millennium project, Trees 2000, has been a huge success.

The Halton Hills environmental group's president, Barb Halsall, reported more than 1,700 students in 14 schools have helped to plant thousands of metre-tall native trees. The planting continues this month with a dozen of the schools planting another 50 trees.

The group received six grants throughout the year which will allow the group to continue to plant in the spring of 2001. Grant providers included the Canada Trust Friends of the Environment, the federal government's EcoAction Fund, and from the provincial government's Trillium Foundation and the Ministry of the Natural Resources.

In addition to the tree planting, POWER provides an environment education component, said Halsall.

"This was a wonderful opportunity to put the kids in touch with their natural world," she said.

Students also received a native species seedling to plant at their homes.

community has just been overwhelming with dozens of adults and teen volunteers coming out on planting days to provide good supervision and encouragement," said Halsall.

"Our community is phenomenal in getting behind things. One woman baked muffins for people. We couldn't have done it without all the help."

The town provided two sites for planting, one at Fairy Lake and the other in Georgetown South, as well providing mulch and watering. Credit Valley Conservation worked closely with POWER and provided four Niagara Escarpment sites. Conservation Halton provided a list of recommended trees and the Acton Legion opened its doors for a student lunch break when planting trees at Fairy Lake.




