Raiders' home woes continue as Capitals record 4-2 victory

omeone is finally starting to distinguish themselves in the Provincial Jr. A League's West Conference. The Georgetown Raiders just wish they weren't doing it at their experience.

The Brampton Capitals have given themselves a little breathing room atop the tightly packed standings after rallying to dump the Raiders 4-2 on Saturday. Combined with their victory over Hamilton on Monday, the Caps have opened up a four-point gap on the rest of the field. And four points is a lot when you consider that's all that separates the next five contenders.

Lumped in the middle of that group are the Raiders, who sit alone in fourth with 23 points, but just two back of second-place Milton.

Anyone showing up regularly to the Alcott Arena must wonder how the Raiders remain in contention. Georgetown

has won just two of its last eight home games.

Saturday, a battered squad opened up a 2-0 second period lead on goals by rookies Daryl Knowles and T.J. Trevelyan. But after a blueline corps that started with only five was reduced to four when Alex Mac-Donnel was tossed for fighting, the Raiders legs started to fade. Costly turnovers helped Brampton pull ahead 3-2 heading into the final period.

With many walking wounded up front as well, including Mason Drew (broken knuckle) and Tristan Fairbarn (injured hip), the Raiders could hardly muster shots on Caps' goalie

Danny Gould, much less goals.

What has kept the Raiders in contention is their play on the road, where they have come up with points in all but one of their last 10 games. Their latest triumph-Friday's 3-1 win over Burlington —is typical of the game they would like to play in front of their own fans.

The Raiders outshot the Cougars 47-19, including 17-2 in the opening period. MacDonnel, who has added some much needed size to the Raider lineup, also showed his offensive capabilities. The fifthround pick of the Brampton Battalion in the '99 draft set up Mike Knoepfli for the first goal and then scored one of his own midway through the first. The Raiders clung to a 2-1 lead until Scott MacDonald scored into an empty net.

"The forecheck was a lot better (Friday)," said Raider coach Simon Couture following Saturday's game. "We

> started to look tired in the second part of the game tonight and we were not putting enough pressure on them."
