## Alcott Arena twinning will mean tax increase

and minor alterations to the site works.

These modifications were chosen because they do not significantly impact the scale, function or operation of the facility.

"To turn back now would be devastating to everyone," said Ward 3 Councillor Jane Fogal. "Everyone will lose faith in this council."

Most of the councillors agreed residents were prepared to pay the tax increase to see the project proceed.

Last night, council unanimously awarded the tender to Melloul-Blamey Construction Inc. of Waterloo which submitted the lowest bid of \$5,092,257 (plus GST). This contractor also built the Acton Arena as well as just recently completing the St. Joseph's School addition.

Adding to that an 8 per cent contingency cost and \$308,000 for fees, studies, inspections and testing, the total cost will be \$5,807,557.

Just to pay for the additional \$1.8 million, the financing will be split three ways:

• a \$1,125,000 debenture (a loan issued through Halton Region)

• \$375,000 generated by an additional charge on all user fees up to \$50,000 annually for 10 years. This special fee will be spent on the facility construction and in the future, on renovation costs. This is subject to consultation with user groups, however Hal Pells, president of Georgetown Minor Hockey Association, said he believed most of his members are opposed to a surcharge.

Wards 1/2 Regional Councillor Rick Bonnette pointed out that surcharges are not new—the users are currently paying special surcharges for theatre use and for ice-surfacing machines. This arena surcharge is not be "a large amount that is going to bankrupt our users," he said.

• \$300,000 from Capital Financing Reserve Fund the single largest annual funding source for capital projects. However, this lowers the reserve balance to about \$650,000— unusually low for a reserve fund.

The town currently is \$6.2 million in debt:

• \$2.4 million for the Acton Arena built in 1996

• \$2 million for roads

 \$1.8 million already issued for two planned recreational facilities (the rink and the recreation centre).

Another \$3.1 million will soon be incurred bringing the total town debt to about \$9 million—\$3 million of this will be paid for by future development charges, but taxpayers will have to pay the remaining \$6 million. That \$6 million will generate over \$2 million in interest costs over the next 10 years.

And still more debt could be incurred. To help pay for the two recreational facilities, the town included \$1.1 million from the sale of town-owned properties. But no properties have yet been sold and the town may have to incur short term debt to finance the projects in the meantime.

The cost of the recreational centre won't be known until the tenders are opened in January. But staff expects that, based on the arena tenders, the costs will be higher—and more debt may have to be incurred.


