# Four schools win Blue Planet Awards

Robert Little and St. \_\_\_Brigid schools were among the 20 Halton schools honoured with Blue Planet Awards after demonstrating a priority on protecting, preserving and enhancing the environment.

Representatives from the schools attended a special ceremony at the Ontario Place Cinesphere, hosted by Halton Region, in partnership with the two school boards.

The Acton and Georgetown schools received these environmental achievement awards because:

Harrison Public School has a long history of successful environmental projects and continues to take on new projects. This year they are involving all of their students and families in planting a woodlot of native trees (100 small trees and 500 saplings). They are implementing an Adopt-A-Habitat program to encourage student and family ownership of the existing Habitat Garden and Bird and Butterfly Garden, in addition to the new mini-forest'.

Students from all grades continue to be involved in weekly recycling, litterless lunches, playground cleanup and promoting the new 'mini-forest' announcements, skits, posters, and models. New steps include starting a composting program this spring.

Holy Cross Catholic School's Green Team is into recycling. They ensure that recycle containers for paper and cans are in each classroom and are well used. They empty containers all around the school on a weekly basis, working with the custodian. The Green

Tarrison, Holy Cross, Team ran a Clothing Drive this winter to recycle used winter clothing for needy families in our community. They are also asking the community to recycle their ink and toner printer cartridges by sending them into the school instead of into the garbage. The Green Team earns one dollar for each recycled cartridge and they

The money raised will be used to support baby elephants orphaned by ivory hunters, to pay for additional kilometres of Trans-Canada Trail and to support the school's environmental initiatives. Robert Little Public School has been involved in several environmental initiatives this year. They

include Earth Kids (a group of students who have worked on the awareness of the mistreatment of zoo animals (including fund-raising), weeding and planting on the school grounds, researching and creating information murals on habitats and pollution, composting, waste reduction, and working on the Trees 2000 project (learning about natural areas and planting native hardwood trees).

The Kids have also participated in the Black Creek Project—the cleanup and replanting of native species to reclaim a wasteland behind the Acton hydro office— this led to the students receiving the Municipal Electrical Association Environmental Excel-lence

St. Brigid Catholic School has had an active environmental club, led by Mrs. Kokelj and Miss Scholz, for the past five years. This is the third time the school has received this award.

The Environmental Club consists of 25 students who pick up from classrooms blue boxes that ' contain recycling paper, pop cans, plastic bottles and pop tabs.

The students have been involved with tree planting for the past two years and have participated in the Trees 2000 Millennium Project, planting native tree species in the Georgetown South Community Park. \*

St. Brigid has an environmental board in the school where classes display artwork to raise awareness of environmental issues. The Drama Club put together a play for an Earth Week assembly entitled The Three Rs. During Waste Reduction Week and Earth Week, students participate in morning announcement quizzes, as well in weekly litterless lunches.
