Rooke had already won the Governor General's Award for Fiction for *Shakespeare's Dog* in 1983, so he had a respectable following, and the first Eden Mills Writers' Festival was born out of the event that saw more than 350 people attend (a surprise for Rooke, who expected about 50 people.)

Since then, the Sunday after Labour Day, thousands flock to the little village, as Rooke and his organizers hold the festival, 'where new writers are introduced to a large audience, and established writers are newly engaged.'

Okay, that's the capsule history lesson. Back to that annual procrastination of mine—actually attending the festival.

I wasn't alone. Co-worker Cynthia Gamble has also been doing that 'I must attend this year' thing for ages too. Every year, we'd return to work the Monday after the festival asking, "Well, did you get there?"

Like me, she had kept putting it off.
Every year I've checked out the lineup of authors who'd be reading excerpts from their new books, as well as signing after the fact.

And every year, I'd give it a pass.
But it finally happened— I came across an author that I couldn't miss seeing.



I bought two of his books at the festival, and would have purchased more had I brought along a bit more cash (although charge cards were widely accepted.)

I chatted briefly with him as he made his way from his reading to the tables, and was pleased to learn the man behind Inspector Banks was a humble, sensitive individual, who was almost shy to chat about himself.

I now have a few signed books from Peter Robinson, and I'm pleased to have met him. As I read my newest Banks mystery, I can actually sense the mood of the man who wrote it.

Of course, I had to flaunt going to the Festival when I saw Cynthia. I was quick to say how I'd been at Eden Mills.

"So was I," she replied.

"You were?" I asked incredulously,
"When?"

"For the opening," she replied.

I guess we were both so engrossed in the event, we failed to see each other. Cynthia watched the Wallin-Fotheringham exchange—and I'm jealous. But if I had to make a choice all over again, Robinson would still win.

And one other thing is certain.
I'll be sure to attend the 2002 Eden Mills
Writers' Festival. As will Cynthia.





 2 days prior to working on your street.
- When we are finished for the day on your street (times indicated in the BLUE LETTER) please turn on your cold water tap in your basement and let it run until the water is clear.
