#### In wake of terrorist attacks

## Board to hire diversity officer

In a blunt assessment of the deficiencies of the Halton ■District School Board in the areas of cultural, religious and ethnic sensitivity, the board's education director has announced the immediate need for a diversity officer.

Using the recent terrorist backlash against some minority groups around North America and within the board's confines as his focal point, Papke told trustees and the public assembled at Wednesday's board meeting that a cultural diversity officer will be hired as soon as possible.

"Last Tuesday (Sept. 11) our world changed, especially for our students," Papke began his impassioned analysis of world-wide reactions to the terrorist attacks on American civilians.

"When people start looking at people of different colour or ethnic background with suspicion or contempt we need to deal with that, but we really lack the means currently to deliver effective socio-cultural advice at the school level in Halton," said Papke.

"We are posting immediately a position for a cultural diversity officer. It is desperately needed. We need to look at race, religion, cultural diversity and violence," he said.

The education director said the individual would likely be hired within two weeks on a part-time, contract basis this year with an eye to a full-time role in the near future.

Papke said his belief in the need for such an employee is not based

on any despicable deeds perpetrated by any Halton public students against visible minorities.

"As a result of (Sept. 11) our schools and communities suffered some incidents but nothing overt," he told those assembled.

Papke vehemently denied a Toronto radio station report on Sept. 11 that indicated Muslim students at an Oakville school were singled out on the public address system and told to go to the office for their safety.

Although no specific serious incidents were reported, he maintains, there is a general feeling that it is time for change at the board.

"We only need to look around this table to see our shortcoming," said the director, alluding to the fact there are no visible minorities among trustees or high-ranking administrative staff.

The board has done the best it can to allay students' fears and answer their multitude of questions relating to the terrorist attacks, said Papke.

Papke's counterpart at the region's Catholic school board said he's received no reports of racerelated problems since Sept. 11.

"We checked last week and this week for incidents related to the U.S. and we haven't had any," said Lou Piovesan, the new director of education for Halton's Catholic board.

The Catholic board does not have a cultural diversity officer and Piovesan says he does not see the need for one at present.




