But while this act of terrorism was horrific, a death occurring as a result of an accident on the highways can be just as devastating to a family. This week, the Ontario Provincial Police launched Operation Impact, which targets road safety this holiday weekend.


Last year, 3,000 people died in car crashes in Canada, and more than 220,000 people were injured. Impaired driving is Canada's number one criminal— note criminal— cause of death and injury. In fact, alcohol is a factor in the deaths of 1,100 Canadians every year—that's three lives every day, according to the OPP.

"When you consider the numbers, they are staggering, if not unbelievable," says an OPP spokesperson.

Other staggering stats—four of every 10 vehicle occupants killed in crashes are unbelted and another one in four fatalities occur at intersections as motorists ignore traffic signals

and signs. So while you're giving thanks for the turkey this weekend, also give thanks for your kids, your spouse, and your self.
